#### Road Safety Campaign Continues Apace

The road safety campaign, launched by Cleveland Road residents in the Spring and which arose because of fears for the safety of pedestrians and cyclists on the roads surrounding the park, continues. The campaign has clear objectives to:

Reduce the speed limit in the area; Introduce traffic calming measures; Narrow the southern end of Cleveland Road to enable the safe crossing of pedestrians; Establish clear and safe pedestrian crossings to Blakers Park. A petition to the City Council needed to gain 1250 signatures to trigger a debate by the full council and, happily, due to the enthusiastic collection of signatures by concerned residents, volunteers and local school children, the target was rapidly exceeded. By the original deadline of 24 June, the combined total of nearly 1900 signatures was handed in to the Council. The next step will be presenting the concerns and objectives of the campaign to the Council in three minutes on 20 October, after which the Council will debate the matter.

### Nature Needs Nurture

All young things need nurture. Children don't thrive without loving care, as well as food and water. Neither do saplings. Sadly, the young trees in Blakers Park have not received the love and attention they need and have not been given the right environment to thrive. Hence, there are six dead saplings in Blakers Park at the moment.

When David Archer and Alistair Peters each led their excellent 'Tours of The Trees', first in October last year and then in May, they both talked about how young trees need to be nurtured. It now seems apparent that the council is not fulfilling this role and it may now be down to the community to step in and take a hand in looking after our trees.

One very important requirement is that the base of each tree should be cleared of grass and weeds and surrounded by mulch, for two reasons. First, it allows water to soak right down where the tree's roots can absorb it. Secondly, it will reduce the chance of CityParks' grass cutting machines from getting so close to the tree that the trunk is damaged. Unfortunately there doesn't seem to have been the resources to carry out this maintenance work around the base of the majority of our young trees. Consequently, most have clearly suffered through lack of water and the trunks of some have been damaged.

All this is especially galling for those of us who have donated trees to the park, usually in memory of a loved one. I myself have had two trees planted over the last eight years in memory of my parents and both saplings have died and had to be replaced. I am now fearful that my replacement tulip tree, planted near the café, is not going to survive, as it is looking poorly and is still very small.

It might be useful for people to contact the Parks Department and ask how the Council can assist us with maintaining the newly planted trees in Blakers Park. At the moment money spent planting trees is being wasted through lack of proper after care. This seems a huge waste and it is such a great loss for all of us who enjoy our park.

The Friends of Blakers Park have already been approached by a local resident who is interested in helping to maintain the trees correctly and he has spoken with Emma Keane, our Park Ranger, about this. She has said it would be fine to go ahead and clear around the trees and she would provide mulch. Are there any volunteers who would be happy to help with this work and form a group to ensure continuing tree maintenance in the future? If so, please contact me on 01273 279 691 so that I can co-ordinate it.
