The Bus Company has a unit which is very helpful and I give them a ring whenever the bus shelters in Beaconsfield Villas have come under fire. Otherwise it is a process of blotting out the defacements with patches of paint. The colour does not always match, but I think people appreciate the effort. The Friends follow the 'broken window' principle: if one window is left unrepaired, then soon all the other windows in a building will be smashed. It is good to see that in other parts of the city people are also 'patching' over graffiti.

In February Blakers Park was targeted and the Clock Tower, Café and park signs on Preston Drove were defaced, but the 'tags' have now been covered up.

You can't please everyone, however. When I asked permission of one person to paint over graffiti, she said, "No, leave it. They'll only come back to do it again."

The first part in an occasional series about the roads around Blakers Park

The Street where I Live

Havelock Road, like most of the neighbourhood, is made up of splendid Victorian houses (especially No. 73 where I have lived for some 20 years) but perhaps it is worth stopping for a moment and wondering who Havelock was? Or perhaps what a Havelock is?

Well my road is indeed named after a prominent Victorian who also given his name to many other places and one strange object. So who was Havelock (and he should be pronounced *have lock* not *haverlock*) and why was our road named after him?

To give him his due, we are talking about Major-General Sir Henry Havelock, KCB born in Sunderland in 1795 and died in India in 1857 about 40 years before the road which bears his illustrious name was built.

If you are keen to get an idea of what this eminent Victorian soldier looked like, next time you are up in Trafalgar Square seek out his statue – which

Ken Livingstone wanted to replace - upon which you will see this rather stern warrior looking out over the city and engraved beneath him the words, *Soldiers! Your labours, your privations, your sufferings and your valour will not be forgotten by a grateful country.*

1857 was the year of the infamous Indian Mutiny and Havelock was in the thick of it, marching his men half way across India to relive the besieged British garrison at Lucknow.

Unfortunately for him he contracted dysentery and died shortly after. But he was not to be forgotten by his *grateful country* being made a baronet, promoted to Major-General, and his widow and son receiving an annual pension of £1,000, enough I suspect to buy more than one new residence in Havelock Road.

So apart from his imperial achievements- if you are British that is - is there anything else worth knowing about him?

Well the Victorians had a thing about statues and there is another of him in his birthplace, Sunderland, there is a district of Nebraska called Havelock, a Havelock Road of course in Lucknow, another in Dartford, Kent where he went to school, a Havelock Town in New Zealand for some reason, and nearer to home another Havelock Road in Croydon which is built over the military academy where he trained.

And why in Brighton? I suspect the South Coast was a place for ex- Indian Army officials and civil servants to retire to their bungalow (named incidentally after Bangalore) or to a newly built terrace house.

And am I happy to live in a road named after such a person? Well, I would probably prefer a Mandela or perhaps Aung San Suu Kyi road but then our neighbourhood reflects not only the people who live here now but also times past – think of Wilson Avenue and Preston Drove a and even our Blaker's park.

And the 'havelock' or strange object named after him? Next time you are in the desert, or better the Foreign Legion, and the mid-day sun is beating down upon your back you'll be grateful for your cap and that useful piece of cloth that hangs down the back to protect your neck. Its name?

Yes you've guessed it – the Havelock.
